Responding to This Lockdown




Our country is currently waiting for contact tracing and genome-matching to be completed. We are all being asked to stay in place to stop the risk of Covid spreading any further while this is done.

This also means that our staff are not allowed to be at school, and we have been directed not to distribute any booklets, learning materials or devices etc yet.

By the weekend I expect that we will know whether this is only a 7-day lockdown, or whether it is going to be longer or more extensive.

This will shape everything for our school, especially with what we do to support our student's learning at home (*more details below*). If this is a short lockdown and we are going to be back in class next Wednesday, then what we do will be very different to a 3-week or longer lockdown.





In the meantime, please do not worry about learning and classwork yet. Please focus on staying safe, and looking out for each other.

Learning at Home

We are well aware that many students left their books and stationery at school on Tuesday afternoon. We are also currently unable to re-enter the school.

Some students, mostly Year 12's and 13's, may have their devices and/or work at home and be able to continue their learning or join in through Google classroom.



I have asked staff who have these in place to keep the current learning going, until we know what the next decisions about the lockdown are.

If this lockdown is extended (like it was in March of last year) we will be providing a full programme for all students, and will be asking for whānau support to ensure that your child completes their work.

But for the next 2 days, please focus on 'well-being at home'.

Students who are planning on engaging in **tertiary study next year**. Please use this time to complete applications to Universities and Polytechnics.




